WHAT ARE E-BOOKS

- E-books and Audiobooks are digital files stored on your device or in the Cloud.
- The most common type are .epub, although .pdf and .azw3 (Amazon) are also found. Audiobooks are often .mp3
- Are they subject to Copyright? YES!
- The Berne Convention bases the term of protection for works by natural persons on the life of the author, and usually for 50 years after the author's death.
- US copyright is somewhat different and has expanded terms.

US Copyright Law

- All works published in the United States before 1924 are in the public domain. Works published after 1923, but before 1978 are protected for 95 years from the date of publication.
- For most works created after 1978, protection lasts for the life of the author plus 70 years. For anonymous works, pseudonymous works, or works made for hire, the copyright term is 95 years from the year of first publication or 120 years from creation, whichever comes first.

PUBLISHERS ACTIVELY ENFORCE THIS

- Digital Rights Management (DRM)
- When you buy an e-book, you do not own a defined object to do with what you wish.
- You actually buy a license to read/listen to the item on designated devices that you own. The seller keeps this information for you to allow for hardware changes.
- Generally, the license terms forbid you to sell, lend, or give this item to someone else. Digital inheritance is still being debated.
- The author may elect to sell without DRM enforcement.

READING DEVICES

- Probably the most popular device is Amazon's Kindle e-Reader; either the Paperwhite or the Fire.
- Also common are the Nook (B&N), Kobo (Rakuten), and the Ipad (Apple).
- Apps are available for any of these to use on PC's, Tablets, or Phones.
- Kindles cost \$100 to \$200; are sometimes on sale.
- Popular Android Tablets from Samsung or Lenovo can be bought for less the \$150. Also, lots of others as cheap as \$50. Most of the devices will also play audiobooks.

WHAT IS THE BEST READING TABLET?

The best reading tablet is the Kindle Paperwhite with reading-specific features like adjustable warm light, as well as a great battery life and screen that's easy on the eyes. Below is an overview of how the best reading tablets compare based on price, display size, and battery life:

E-BOOK STORES AND LIBRARIES

- Amazon, Barnes & Noble, Kobo, iTunes, Google Play
- The seller establishes and account for you and stores your purchases in it. You can generally access them from your device. Or you may be able to "download" the file to your reader for offline use.
- Peoria residents have 2 libraries available in "The Greater Phoenix Digital Library" – Maricopa County (Sun City @99th and Bell) and Peoria (@95th and Lake Pleasant)
- There are numerous online libraries and maybe a summer residence. All you need is a Card.

THE LIBRARY EXPERIENCE

- Go to the Greater Phoenix website <u>https://phoenix.overdrive.com/phoenix-maricopa/content</u>
- You will be asked to install "Libby" which is the preferred reader for the library. However, on a PC you can install "Adobe Digital Editions".
- Then enter your Library card Number and Pin.
- You can borrow books either in the epub format or for a Kindle.
- At the end of the loan period, you will be unable to open the book unless you renew it. On a Kindle, Amazon will offer to sell it to you.

FREE E-BOOKS

- Most sellers will offer free e-books; generally those out of copyright.
- There are many online libraries such as:
- 1. Open Library
- Open Library is one of the largest eBook libraries on the internet. This eBook website offers books related to almost all topics. Open Library is a free book resource tool that you can use to access millions of books instantly and effortlessly. From art to science fiction and cookbooks, you can find it all on Open Library.

ONLINE LIBRARIES

• 3. Project Gutenberg

 Project Gutenberg is another vast resource library and free eBook website that contains thousands of books for you to read online or download on your device. The site contains PDF, EPUB, Kindle eBooks, and other file formats. Project Gutenberg is also one of the oldest eBook sources, dating back to 1971.

4. <u>Library Genesis</u>

 Library Genesis is an expansive online library with some of the best eBooks available. Library Genesis also comes with a Desktop application for offline use. You can search and download your desired books and upload content or articles to contribute to the library's resources.

AUDIOBOOKS

- Tapes and CD's are no more. The current versions are .mp3
- You can buy or borrow from the same sources as ebooks.
- On a PC, you use Libby or the discontinued "Overdrive for Windows" which will download an mp3 file.
